THE TORRINGTON 100 PROJECT

What is it?

The two Torrington GP Health Centres, Torridge Voluntary Services (TTVS), the Care Forum and The Plough are working together on a pilot to connect people with things they would like to do but for some reason cannot manage. The problem could be transport, nothing local enough that appeals or being low and de-motivated. The pilot is part of a new group called Torrington 100 – the 100 being the one hundred square miles and 16 villages around Torrington served by the two GP practices.

Two local people, Bridget Cordory and Cathy Richards, have just started work as Community Developers for the project and are visiting all 16 villages and Great Torrington to look at what's going on already and what people would like to be happening. They want to know what's stopping people from getting involved too.

Torrington 100 will be using the 2nd October (see below) to launch the project and they want to listen to your views. They are looking for people to help act as a local focal point: so if you are interested you can volunteer to be a contact for your village.

The First Farmers in Peters Marland

Farming originated in the middle east and first arrived in the British Isles during the Neolithic Period (4000 to 2200 BC). It probably extended across the country through a combination of immigration and the spread of ideas from mainland Europe.

There is evidence of these first farmers (and other earlier and later settlers) in and around Peters Marland. Flints from the Neolithic and Mesolithic (10,000 to 4000 BC) have been unearthed locally. A number of Neolithic polished stone axe heads have also been found in and around the parish. Although there are no positively identified prehistoric burial mounds in Peters Marland, there are some in adjacent parishes. It is therefore most probable that originally there would have been more burial mounds as well as the settlements to go with them. Unfortunately these sites have been lost.

The early farmers would not have relied solely on farming but would also have been expert hunters and gatherers. It was these people who first started to clear the land of trees. They grew an ancient form of wheat, kept cattle, sheep and pigs, made the first pottery in Britain and fashioned tools and artefacts out of bone, antler and flint. Stone axe heads and flint would have been imported into this area from other locations where they were mined or quarried. There was a flint mining area at Beer in South Devon.

Even though the landscape has changed somewhat over the last few thousand years, it is good to know that there is still some continuity and that people have lived and farmed here for millenia.

So next time you are digging in your garden or field, look out for that piece of flint or pottery: it may just connect you with the person who dropped it thousands of years ago.
